Notes of the Reading Monthly Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business—Sunday, January 14, 2018

Agenda approved as presented.

Minutes of Twelfth Month Meeting for Business corrected to add Pat Jackson to the ad hoc insurance review committee. Approved as amended.

Treasurer's Report: No report as the treasurer waits for end of year 2017 information.

Maiden Creek Hedge Update: Jennifer Hanf explained that a committee has come to the conclusion that the boxwood hedge at Maiden Creek meetinghouse should be replaced with a more practical fence. The current hedge has been declining for several years and a non-living barrier will require much less maintenance. It is necessary to have some kind of physical barrier between our Maiden Creek property and the City of Reading property next to it. She presented a drawing to show a three-rail split rail fence with a few shrubs at the driveway entrance. Jim Hall reminded us that the fence should be high enough to allow mowing under the bottom rail. Heather Ehrlich added that quotes were solicited from three different fence companies for a three-rail split rail fence with hemlock rails and black locust posts. The quotes ranged from approximately \$6,000 to \$8,000. The meeting was asked to and did approve contracting with one of these companies. Heather also asked for an additional \$250 for plantings. The meeting approved the \$250 but asked for a specific plan before plants are purchased and installed.

Nominating Committee: Marie Ryan agreed to serve as the third member of this committee. With her addition, the 2018 Committee List was approved.

Recorder's Report: Cys Sica, recorder, reported that the meeting lost six members last year. Four losses were due to death, one was a transfer, one was a meeting removal. The membership as of January 1, 2018, is 54 members and 3 associate members for a total of 57. Roger Lawn asked if a date has been decided for the memorial service for Charmoine Jones. Marie Ryan added she spoke with Kerry Lee, Charmoine's daughter, about having it Saturday, March 24, 2018. That date was added to the calendar, in pencil, as it is

not 100% firm. The plan also includes the burial of both Charmoine and Curtis Jones' ashes at Maiden Creek Sunday, March 25.

The Recorder asked if anyone knew of the status of meeting member Lillian Emery. Jeanne Elberfeld found she was deceased in 2017, via a Google search.

Peace and Social Concerns: Jeanne Elberfeld reported that \$151 was donated during the Christmas tea. \$150 was contributed to the holiday meal for 60 people held at the Berks Family Detention Center as approved during Twelfth Month 2017, Meeting with Attention to Business. Also, beautiful, new, reusable glass jar luminarias were made and placed along the front sidewalk of the meetinghouse Christmas Eve.

Meetinghouse Safety: Pat Jackson reported that this committee will hold its first meeting Sunday, January 14, 2018. Members are Peter Frank, Jeanne Elberfeld, John Loomis, Blair Seitz and Pat Jackson.

Gifts and Loans: A report is deferred as the committee has not met since last Meeting for Business.

Swatara Planning Committee Seeks Workshop Leaders for Caln Quarter Weekend, May 2018

George Fox was inspired to search because the prevailing religious ceremonies, rituals, and traditions were obstacles to his internal seeking of God. Throughout the past 300 years, Quakers have led on issues of slavery, prison conditions, poverty, women's rights, Native American affairs, environmental insults, and war. Obstacles arise but Quakers tenaciously persevere in their testimonies to create opportunities for change.

The Caln Quarter Swatara Planning Committee has chosen the theme **Obstacles and Opportunities: Quaker's past lessons illuminating the way forward** for the Caln Quarter annual weekend retreat at Camp Swatara, May 4, 5 and 6.

The Committee invites all members and attenders of Caln Quarter to offer their gifts and talents for workshops related to this theme.

Consider the many lessons that are waiting to be rediscovered by looking back on Quaker history. These lessons can guide our choices.

We are calling on Quaker members and attenders to share their knowledge and experience of Quaker past lessons, present obstacles and opportunities, and considerations of future paths of action. In a spirit of love and acceptance we ask you to search your heart for your unique voice, or passion, which could be shared with others.

Workshops can be formal or informal, are scheduled for approximately one hour, and are held Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. We will be limiting the number of workshops to 6 this year, 3 for Saturday afternoon and 3 for Sunday morning. Our plenary speaker, Adrian Martinez, will present one of the Sunday morning workshops. We encourage a diversity of workshops. These could feature experiential learning, discussions, a lecture format - whatever you imagine- that fit the theme.

Our plenary speaker, Adrian Martinez, renowned Chester County, Quaker artist who has captured Penn and Native Americans in one extensive painting project, will show us images from his recent, five year effort painting Humphrey Marshall's Quaker story. He will speak about the obstacles encountered by Marshall and lessons gleaned from those obstacles.

Our workshops on Saturday will focus on present day Quaker life and how the lessons from early Quakers influence or direct our current work.

The Sunday workshops will focus on Quakerism in the future. What will living the Quaker testimonies look like in the future? How do we move forward in activism and outreach with challenging changes in science, politics, social justice issues, and global issues with Quaker integrity?

The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson is the Friendly Readers' selection for Spring.

Suggested by Patty Jackson and heartily seconded by Bonnie Knutsen, this book is a beautifully written, non-fiction account of three families, who, like 6 million other black citizens, fled the South for northern and western cities, in search of a better life. What they left in the South is shocking to read and deserves to be remembered. What they found at the end of their journey was nearly as disheartening.

Wilkerson's vivid reporting of the past helps us understand how and why African Americans view the world they way they do today.
